● Viewers worldwide saw the first ever high-resolution color pictures of Mars when the Mars Global Surveyor took July 4. The probe sent its most impressive, color and infrared photographs data for three months.



● The \$4.25 million, Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History says "Joh," the most complete *Synanthracis* ever found yet discovered. The site was on October 4 at a factory in New York.



● British scientists in February 2007 announced the world's first cloning of an adult mammal. The cloned, named Dolly, looks remarkably like the possible source of the technology.



● In September 2007, a team of scientists discovered a fossilized dinosaur egg found in China, which is a dinosaur embryo.

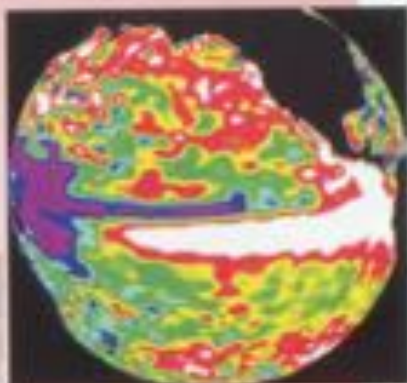

- Alan York of the Beastie Boys engineers the second Clinton Foundation Concert, held in New York, offering 27 music acts and a live-TV political message.



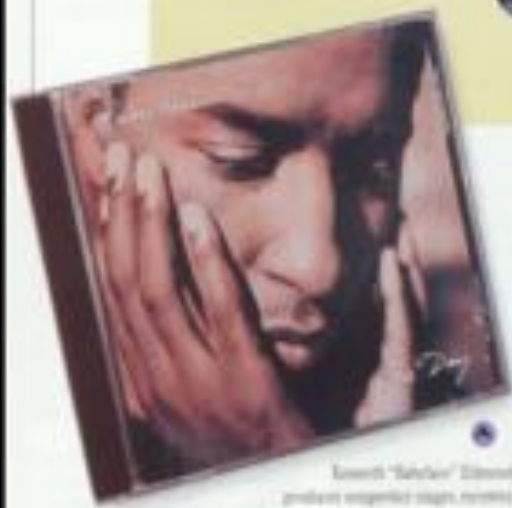

Tiger Woods, 21, becomes the youngest golfer ever to win the Masters Tournament. He 54-over-par score sets a Masters record. Woods wins a PGA Tour tournament and sets a PGA Tour earnings record of \$1.1 million for the season.



Mike Tyson wins all parts of Evander Holyfield's ear and is disqualified in the WBA heavyweight rematch in June 1997. There is a total purse of \$2 million and the boxing license is revoked.

Swedish golfing phenomenon Annika Sorenstam, 26, tops the LPGA earnings list in 1997 with a record \$1,236,786.

Professional sports salaries keep skyrocketing. One of the most publicized of 1997 is Kevin Garnett's \$126 million contract to play basketball for the Minnesota Timberwolves.



Pittsburgh Penguins' Mario Lemieux returns in April 1997 after a spectacular comeback from Hodgkin's disease and injury. Lemieux is elected to the Hockey Hall of Fame in September.

- The Chicago Bulls beat the Utah Jazz to claim 1997 for their 5th NBA championship in seven years. Michael Jordan is chosen *Final MVP* a record 5th time.



- Nagano, Japan, hosts the 1998 Winter Olympic Games during February. There are world sports events from 13 sports, including curling, ice hockey and women's ice hockey.



- When the college football season ends, two teams claim the national championship. Michigan (11) is named No. 1 by the sports writers' poll, and Nebraska (11) is the coaches' poll.

- Steven Red Wing captures Steve Tompkins' record for most in the 1997 Ryder Cup Championship, 49 out of 52 points, by sweeping the Philadelphia Press in two games.



- In its 30th season, the WNBA reveals all league expansion for seasons. The Houston Comets' championship was won by the New York Liberty over the Detroit Pistons.



## Flash

Women affiliate in an all-male professional sports league for the first time. The players, Dee Kasher and Robert Palmer, are referred to the NBA.

Mark McGuire, of the St. Louis Cardinals, slams 52 homers in 1996 and 54 in 1997. McGuire becomes only the second player to launch 100 home runs with back-to-back, 50-home-run seasons, the other being Babe Ruth.

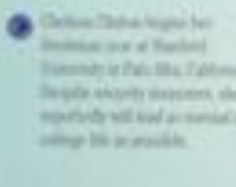

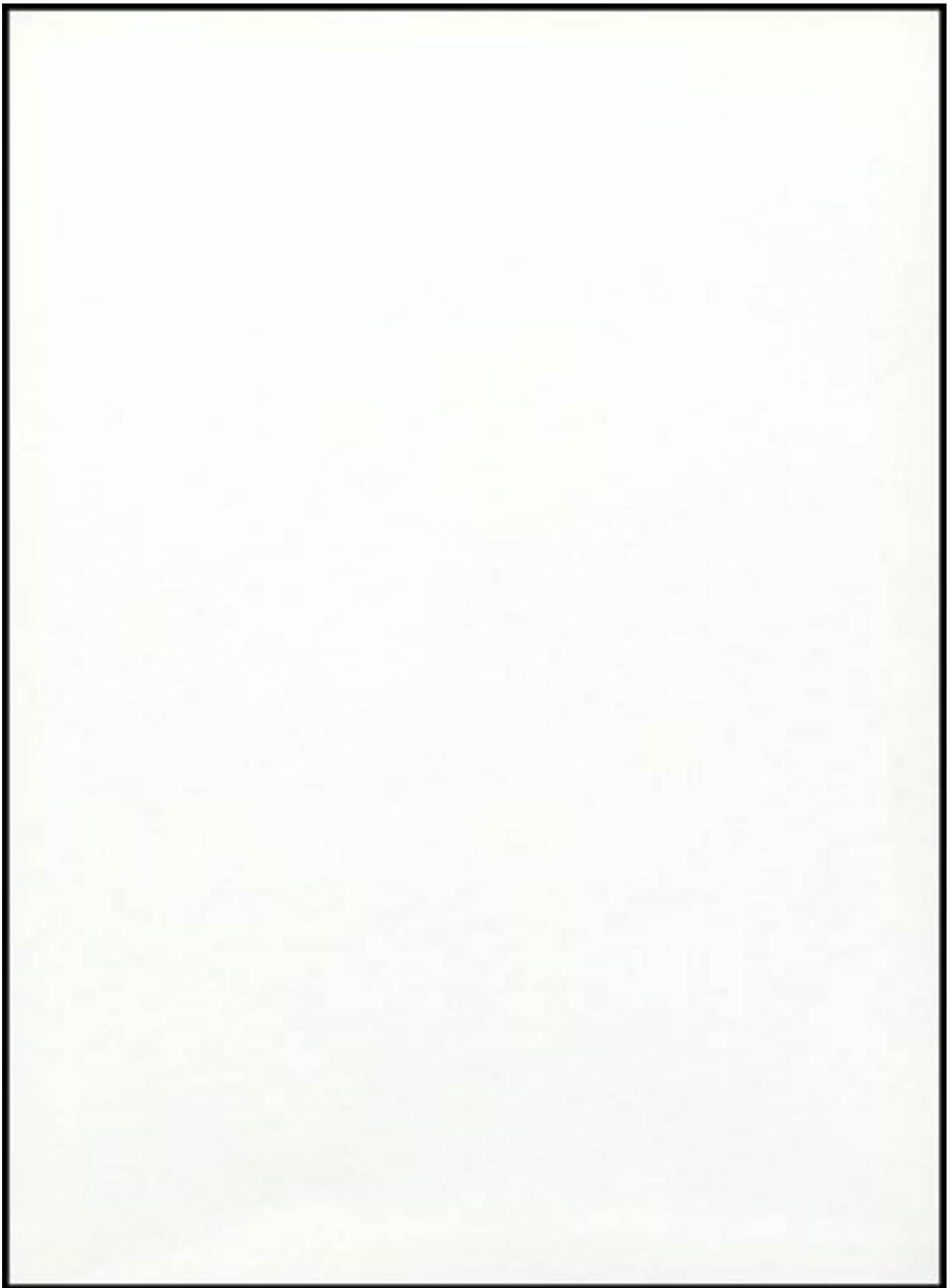
Super John Denver dies in October at 63 when the experimental plane he is piloting crashes into California's Mother's Day.

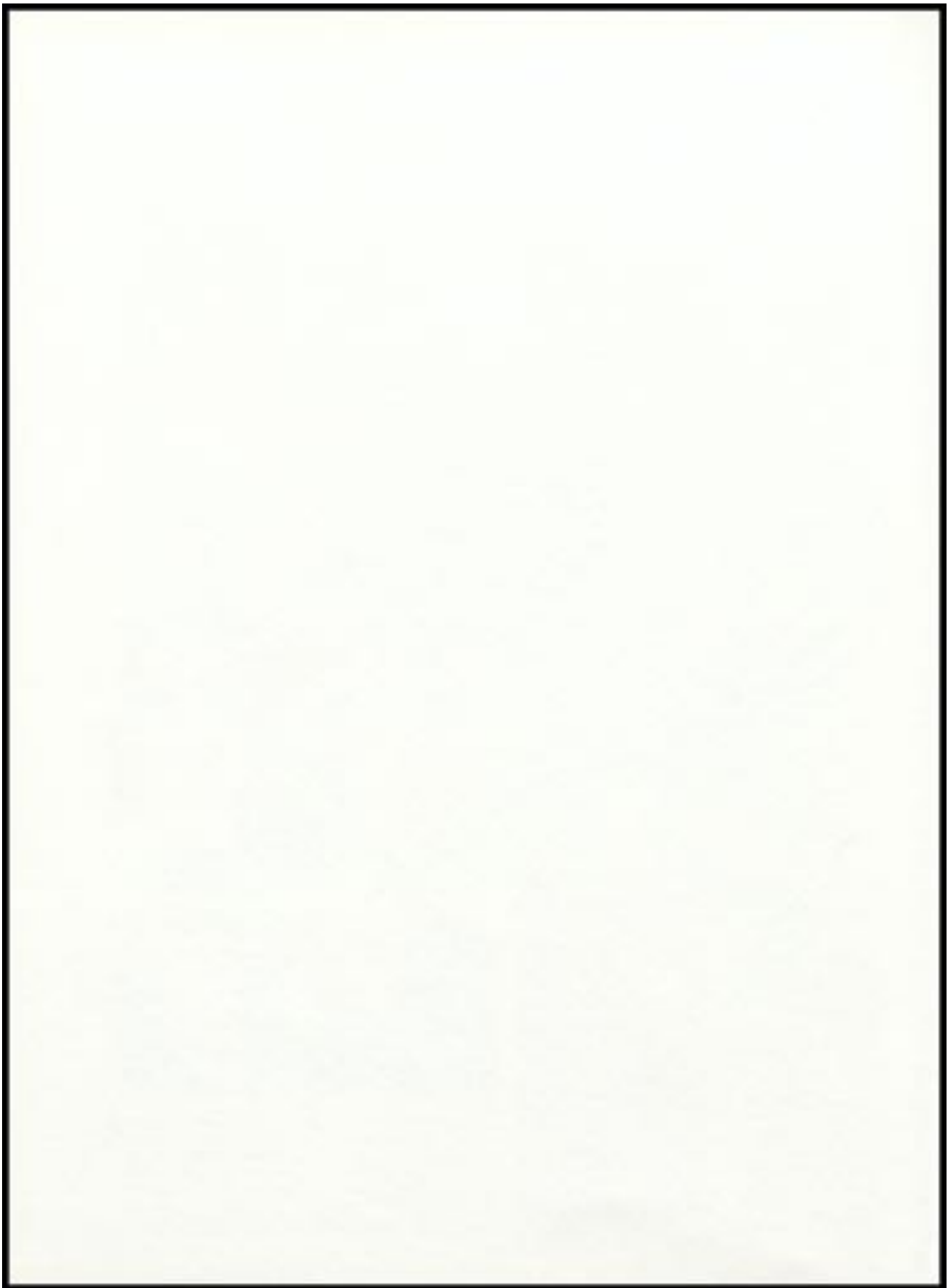


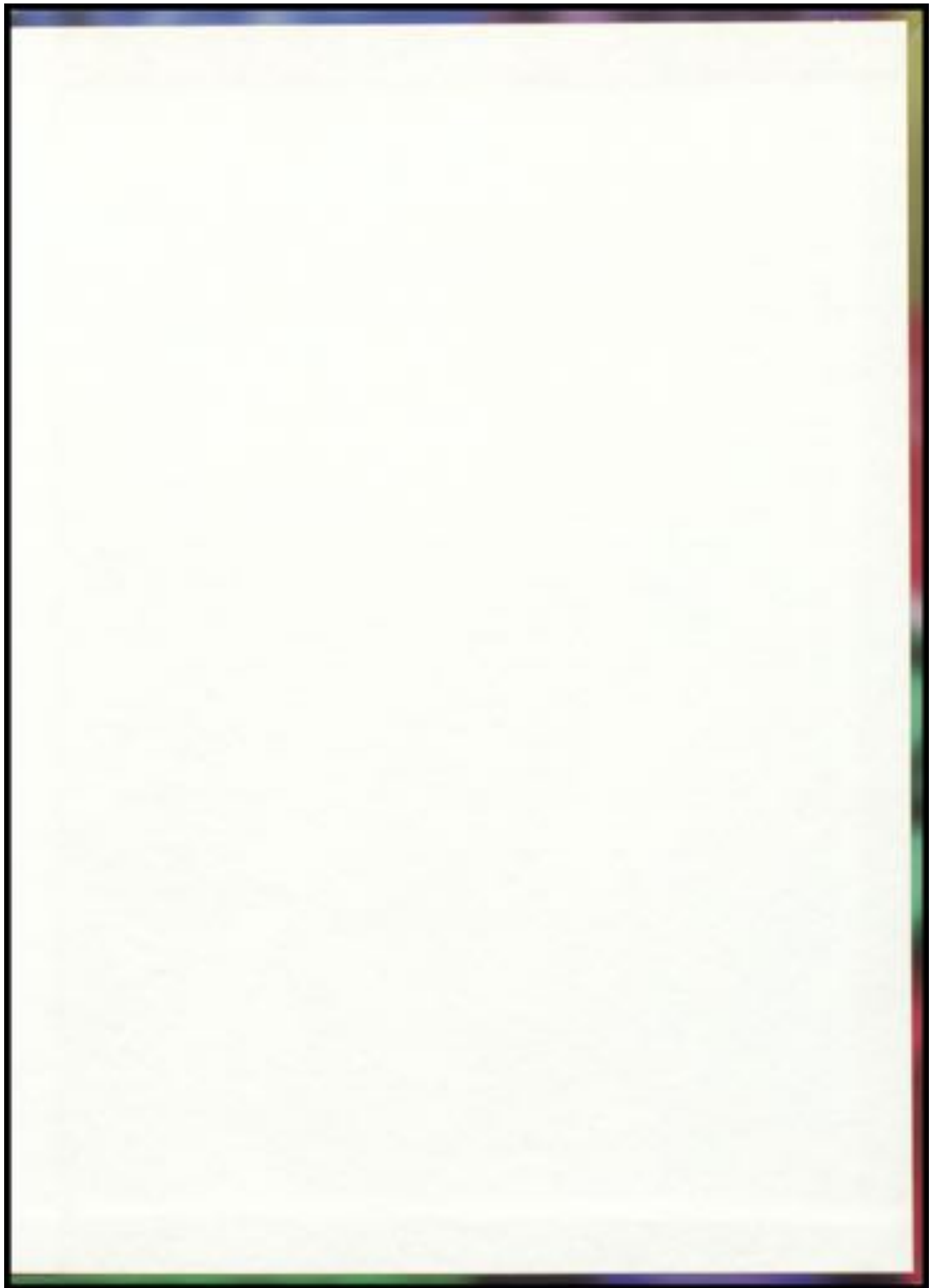
