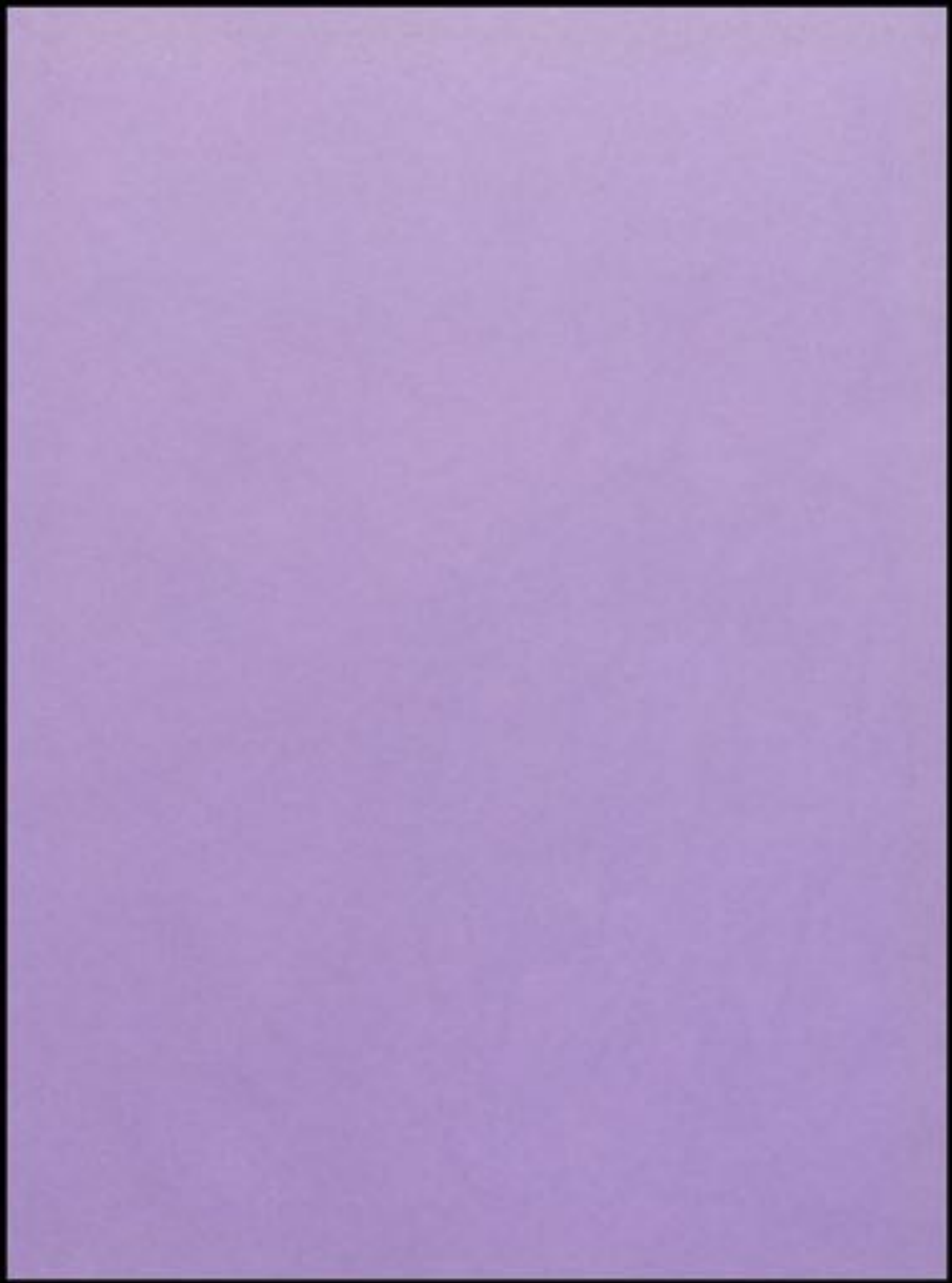

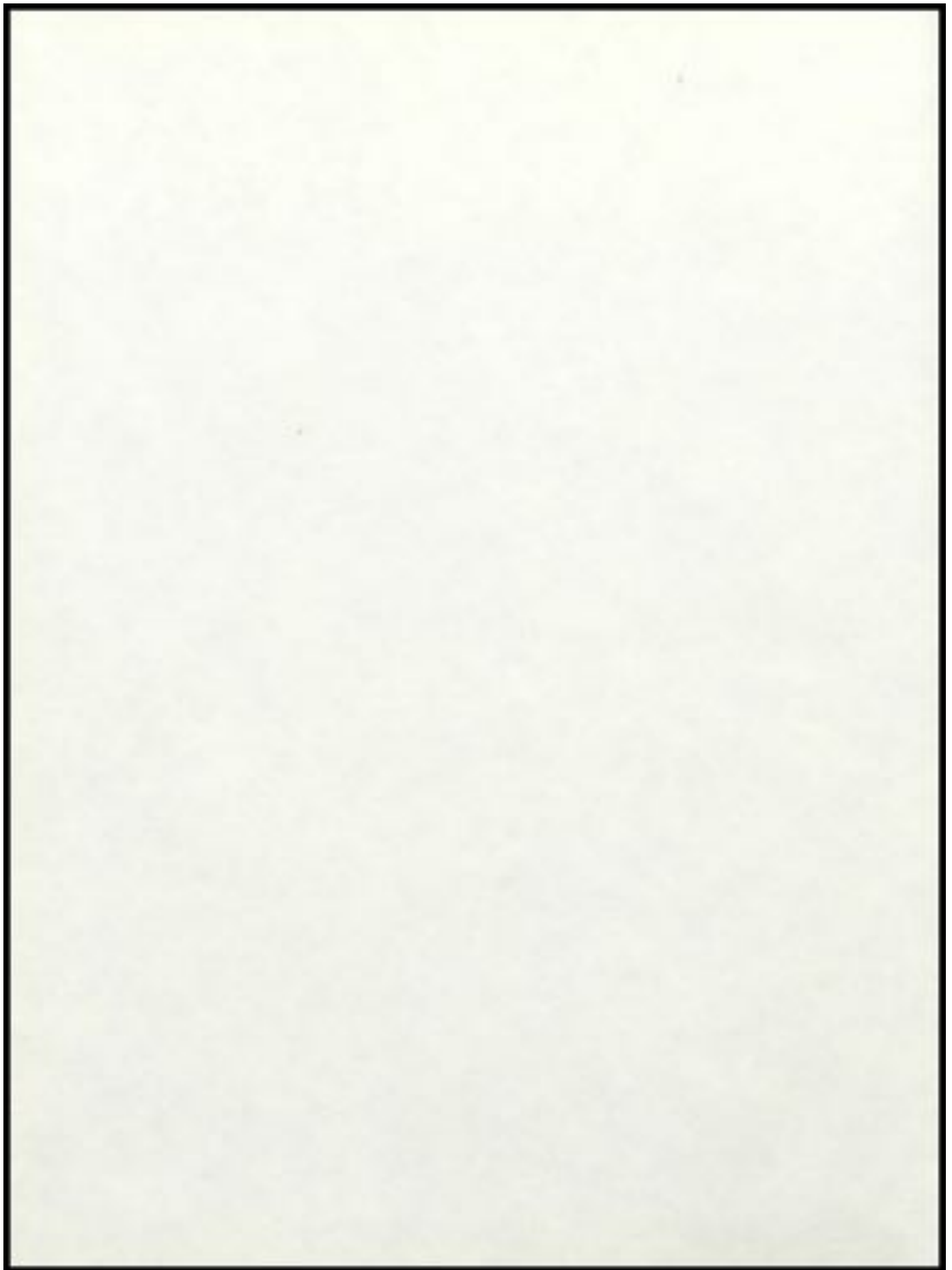

Music students from band and choir visited Chicago to perform in a clinic at the VanderCook College of Music as well.



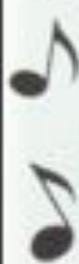

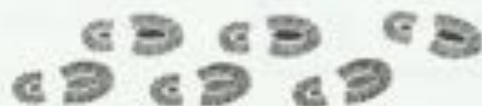
